Q. This building is now the public library but was originally built in 1915 for a different purpose. What was it?

Q. In 1844, this family settled on land that would later become Rolla. Who were they?

Q. This structure was built in 1882 to provide a permanent building for students after fire destroyed the one they were occupying. What was its name?

Q. This facility was one of only two hospitals in the United States devoted to the treatment of this disease. What was the name of the illness?

Q. This company provided wage-paying jobs for women, some of whom entered the workforce for the first time. What did they manufacture?

Q. It began its history as a supply apparatus for the Union Army but was sold as government surplus after the Civil War and served a new purpose. What did it become?

Q. This commercial enterprise helped maintain Rolla as a regional commercial center after the Civil War. What was it?

Q. When the first train rolled into Rolla in 1860, this area was considered to be downtown Rolla, later renamed "Old Town". Where was it centered?

Q. This church celebrated the 70th anniversary of its founding in 1935. Who was it named for?

Q. This building served as the Rolla Post Office for a time but was originally constructed by Joseph Campbell to serve another purpose. What was it?

Q. T.J.'s Bar and Grill is one of the oldest buildings remaining in Downtown Rolla and one of the last surviving structures of this "rowdy" area of town. What was the nickname of this area?


Q. Its electrically lighted sign made it a landmark on Pine Street. Though the name has changed, the lighted sign and building still remain. What was the original name of the building?

Q. Construction on this building began in 1860. Under Union Army control, it was used as a warehouse, office and hospital for three years before being returned to the owners to complete construction. What did it become?
